Mission Statement

The University of Utah Spencer Fox Eccles School of Medicine serves all people and communities of Utah and the Intermountain West by intentionally supporting and improving individual and community health outcomes and quality of life. This is achieved through excellence in equitable patient care, education, and research by:

- Purpose fully educating scientists and health care professionals to ensure compassionate, equitable, patient-centered care to all, prioritizing communities of greatest need.
- Serving rural and underserved communities by prioritizing and acting to address social determinants of health to eliminate structures and practices that lead to health disparities among all people.
- Engaging in scholarly research to advance knowledge, innovation, well-being, and health equity for all people.
- Fostering a culture of belonging, anti-racism, and anti-discrimination through strategic recruitment, retention, and recognition of efforts among students, trainees, staff, faculty, and community partners.

Phase 1 (Year One)

- Houses: Students will be put into one of six houses that they remain in for 4 years
- Student-Led Clinics: Students will spend one to two half days per week in student-led clinics.
- *Essentials Courses:* Learning of foundational sciences is organized into organ-system courses and Problem-based learning.
- **Doctoring Courses:** Learning clinical sciences (diagnostics, patient history, conducting a physical, etc.) is aligned with essentials courses and occurs within houses in the classroom and student-led clinics.
- SCoPE(Skills, Community, and Professional Exploration) is a six-week intro course every new MD student will be enrolled in to learn basic clinical skills and where to go for help during the next four years.

Phase 2 (Year Two)

- Longitudinal Integrated Clerkships: Duration: Full year
- *Team-Based Learning:* Students will use <u>team-based learning</u> three to four times monthly. This will enhance the learning and retention of core sciences.

*Note: Houses, student-led clinics and doctoring courses will continue.



Phase 3 (Years Three &

- Advanced Integrated Science Selectives: Complete at least two Advanced Integrated Science Selectives
- *Student-Led Councils:* Councils organize advanced learning opportunities for students to grow their knowledge/skills.
 - Ex: Rural Health Council

*Note: Houses, student-led clinics, and doctoring courses will continue.

Suicide by Firearm in Teton County, WY Using Gun Safe Magnet to Increase Secure Storage Practices

Hypothesis

 Increasing secure firearm storage practices and awareness of local mental health resources will reduce incidence of suicide by firearm in Teton County, WY

Background

- Teton County population: 23,280
- In the 2021 Community Needs Assessment, mental health was identified by community members as the top priority health problem
- Teton County residents' mental health is complicated by lack of affordable housing and a tourism-based culture that normalizes excessive alcohol use
 - Binge drinking rates are nearly double the state and national average
 - Highest per capita income in the country (\$148,002), while the average worker makes \$41,052 a year
- · Wyoming has the highest rate of suicide in the nation
- Nearly 2/3 of suicide deaths in Wyoming are by firearm
- There were 7 suicides in Teton County in 2021, 4 of which were by firearm

Literature Review

- · Many suicide attempts occur with less than 5 minutes of deliberation
- Those who store their firearms locked and/or unloaded are less likely to attempt suicide by firearm
- Community-based efforts may be effective in reducing suicides
 - Evaluating local data, officials in Washington County, OR focused their suicide prevention efforts to animal shelters, motels, and eviction notices. Suicide rates have fallen by 40%

Deliverables to Community

- Recent community efforts include free firearm locks sponsored by the Community Prevention Coalition of Teton County
- To complement these efforts, infographics and magnets for firearm safes (shown below) were developed to include information on risk of suicide by firearm, secure storage practices, crisis hotlines, and local mental health resources

Details of Distribution Plan

- Target audience: gun owners, ranching community, residents of Moran (Teton County's most rural community)
- Distribution: locations accessed by Teton County's gun owners and most rural residents such as the saddle shop, feed supply store, gun retailers, shooting range, and a bar which acts as the center of social life for Moran ranching community
- Ideal behavioral outcomes:
 - Increased safe storage practices
 - Greater awareness and utilization of local mental health services

Possible Next Steps

- Advocate for free gun locks to be distributed at sites more accessible for those not regularly interacting with the healthcare system or community organizations
- Enlist local gun retailers and law enforcement as community partners for voluntary, temporarily gun storage

Intermountain Health Population Student Scholars Program

Overview & Goal

- Collaborative medical education program that started through a 50 million dollar endowment from Intermountain to the University of Utah
- Goal to improve the health and well-being for the people of Utah and the Intermountain West through training physicians who will deliver care using an innovative and robust population health framework



Program Components

- Financial Assistance
 - Scholars receive half of their tuition and fees in the form of a forgivable loan
- Mentorship
 - Scholars are paired with a current Intermountain physician mentor
- Education
 - Scholars must complete a graduate certificate in Population Health Science
- Employment
 - Guaranteed employment opportunity with Intermountain
 - Four (4) years of employment for loan to be entirely forgiven

Admissions Requirements


- Are Utah residents and/or enrolled members in one of the <u>American Indian tribes</u> whose reservation or trust lands lie partly or wholly within Utah
- Faced socioeconomic hardships growing up
- Grew up in a rural and/or medically underserved community
- Demonstrate a commitment to practice medicine in rural, tribal/indigenous areas, and/or medically underserved communities
- Are first-generation college students

Applicants must meet the admissions criteria established by the School of Medicine Admissions Office including:

- Completion of a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution in the United States or Canada
- GPA and MCAT score that fit within this matrix model:
 - An MCAT Total of 494-497 and an undergraduate GPA of 3.80 or higher
 - \circ An MCAT total of 498-499 and an undergraduate GPA of 3.60 or higher
 - An MCAT total of 500 and an undergraduate GPA of 3.00 or higher
