UPCOMING EVENTS

Livestock Quality Assurance

Teton County will be hosting a Livestock Quality Assurance training at the Weatherbeater on Monday, April 2 at 2 pm. Teton County 4-H members must attend one LQA training every two years to be eligible for county carcass awards. It is highly recommended that first-year market animal project members also attend. LQA teaches members about livestock nutrition, health, facilities, and ethics. This is a good opportunity to bring your steers and tie them in the barn for a bit. Travis Standley, Hubbard Feed Rep and Livestock Judge, will be discussing proper feeding of your market and breeding projects. We should be wrapping up by 4:00 at the latest. Make sure to dress warmly, as the weather is taking a turn later this week and the Weatherbeater is unheated. We will have another LQA training, probably in May, for those who can't attend this one.

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Western Heritage Shooting Sports

As things are slowly thawing out, we're making plans for the 2018 Teton County Western Heritage Shooting Sports program. The Western Heritage Program is a great way to learn about firearm safety, how to properly and



accurately shoot replica firearms from the 1860s-1900s, and gain knowledge of Western America's traditions. We had a great year in 2017 with several 4-H members competing at the national contest in Fort Benton. The 2018 national contest will be held in Deer Lodge and then will be held out of state for several years. We meet one Saturday per month at the Sun River Rangers shooting complex. This is located west of Simms toward Augusta on Highway 21. It is approximately 2 miles past the Lowry Bridge/Floweree Road turn on the left. We will meet April 21, May 19, June 16, July 21, August 18 and September 15. The practices will be 10:00 am - 3:00 pm with a potluck lunch at noon. Currently, 4-H members are only responsible for their old west

MONITORING YOUR SHOW PIG'S PROGRESS

Major stress can occur when you bring your feeder pig home. The change in feed and stress of transport are the primary ones. To minimize the stress associated with the change in feed, find out what type of feed the pig has been receiving and either purchase a 2 to 4-day supply from the producer or their supplier. Then make changes to a new feed over several days. Young feeder pigs will often scour or develop diarrhea because of the multiple stressors that occur at the change of ownership. Therefore, you should consider the administration of antibiotics (injectable or in the feed or water) for the first few days after you bring them home.

Adequate facilities are another crucial factor in making sure your market hog gains well. Elaborate facilities are not essential for a successful project, but you do need to provide the proper environment to ensure your pig stays healthy and grows well. The determining factors are both the size of the pig and the environmental temperatures. Many project pigs are purchased around 90 pounds. The comfort zone for these young animals is 70° to 85° F, and they can easily suffer chilling that can impact their health and growth performance. Therefore, it is critical to consider their effective temperature when preparing the facilities and transporting these pigs home, particularly when night-time temperatures drop well below their comfort zone. In the winter and spring, it is important to provide an insulated area in the facility that is draft-free, with deep, dry straw bedding and possibly zone heating for young feeder pigs. As pigs grow, their comfort zone drops to 60° to 75°F and it becomes critical to provide shade and cooling to ensure good growth during the hot summer months. Many swine project members use fans and misters during hot weather.

Knowing the health care history will help you design a health program of your own, including: when and what booster shots you need to give your pig; how soon to treat for internal and external parasites; and if medication is needed in the feed. The key to a healthy pig is a good preventative health program. Pigs should be dewormed routinely to maintain a good growth rate. The deworming schedule should be based on the label instructions. When giving your pig any medications or animal health products, always follow the label directions. Follow withdrawal time requirements carefully for all market hogs because they will enter the human food chain. Failure to follow withdrawal times can result in illegal residues in the carcass. If you have a choice of the route of administration of any medication between subcutaneous and intramuscular, always choose the subcutaneous route. Intramuscular injections do affect the quality of the food product you are producing. They not only cause lesions in the form of abscesses or scars, but they can result in the surrounding muscle tissue being unacceptably tough. Therefore, if you must give an intramuscular injection, it should be given in the neck region because this is a lower value area of the carcass.

To ensure proper growth, it is critical to provide a balanced commercially prepared ration design for growing and finishing pigs. There is no one magic feed that will make a champion, it is the total nutritional program, including the feeding schedule, the exercise and the careful daily observation during the growing and finishing phases that help make a champion. Make sure to read the label on the feed to make sure you are feeding the appropriate feed for the size of the pig, because a pig's nutritional requirements change as the pig gets older. You should change the feed to accommodate these changes. However, never make abrupt changes in the type or amount of being fed. Many may start with a starter diet, moving to a grower diet and finally transition to finisher ration. Fresh water is the most important nutritional factor for any animal. Your pig should consume between 4 to 8 pounds of feed per day. Pigs can be either self-fed or hand fed at least twice daily. To make sure that your pig is growing on schedule, you should weigh it on a regular basis. Always weigh at the same time of the day to avoid variation due to feeding and watering.



FOR THE RECORD by Jane Wolery

When it comes to record books, the <u>real</u> goal we are trying to accomplish is teaching our 4-H members the "5th H". The unspoken 5th H is **Habit**. In much of what we do in 4-H, we are trying to instill habits in youth so that they are well-prepared and contributing adult members of the community. With record books, we are looking for habits: **habits** of keeping records; **habits** of tracking income and expenses; **habits** of tracking animal health care and feed; **habits** of tracking productivity and progress toward goals; **habits** of tracking community service efforts; **habits** of tracking their own learning. All these **habits** result in self-directed adults. Below are four ideas to help with record books:

- 1. **Pomodoro Technique**: Set a time each month to update records and when it is time to complete the "sloppy copy" set a timer. The timer may be set for different amounts of time, depending on the 4-H member's age. You can use the Pomodoro Technique (research online). For 6-12 grade students, set a timer for 25 minutes. Work on the task until the timer rings. Take a five-minute break. Put a check mark on a sheet to mark each set of 25 minutes of concentrated effort toward the project. When you have reach four 25-minute sessions, take a break. If 4-H members make a habit of updating the record book monthly, it may only take 25 minutes each time.
- 2. **Incentivize**: Not only set the timer, but also set a reward. Most of us need an incentive as we start to build a new habit. Rewards could be to have a friend over, to bake something, to go outside and play, to go sledding with a parent, for a parent to do a chore normally assigned to the 4-H member, to read a book, to go swimming ... there are many inexpensive and effective ways to create an incentive. Be sure to agree to the incentive with the 4-H member *before* the work session begins so they know what they are working toward then give the reward as quickly as possible after the task is completed.
- 3. **Parent Trap**: If you get stuck in a trap where your 4-H member and you are not enjoying working together on record books, find another family and swap! Usually a 4-H member will work more diligently and agreeably with someone other than their parent. Set aside a time with another 4-H family. Maybe you can even all meet together, but each 4-H member works with an adult who is not their parent. The mutual incentive could even be a family potluck and games or a movie night afterward.
- 4. **Function Over Form**: I don't know about you, but in my lifetime, I've seen plenty of changes in the *way* we do things, but not as much in the things we do. For instance, when I applied for a State 4-H Award as member three decades ago, I handwrote the application and hired a typist (my mom suggested it) to complete the rest. When I was in college, I had a small word processor/typewriter that stored about five pages worth of written content. At one point, we used faxes, then emails and scanners, now tablets and "talk-to-text" to complete records. Most recently, it seems online portals are the way I complete many records. My point is that over the course of our 4-H member's lifetimes, they will have many ways that they complete record-keeping tasks. Try not to get stuck on a form. If the online fillable .pdf files are not working, try something else. The idea is to teach them the *function* of record keeping. Our 4-H members are in a digitally recorded, visually rich world. If they want to use the "notes" function on their phone and supplement with text and photos and print it out, and it includes the information the regular record book form requests, they are still learning the function of keeping records. Keep the overall goal in mind. Do not fight a "form" for too long. If you are having trouble with some of the technical aspects, contact our office to see if we can help by converting a form or offering other suggestions. Keep in mind the function of the task, which is to learn to keep records of some form, as record keeping is a task nearly all members will be required to do at some point in their future.









COMMUNICATION DAY by Jen Asselstine

It is not often that a person can learn about Montana Public land use, how to make slime and the possibility of a new continent all in the same night. These were a few of the topics presented at the Teton County 4-H Communication Day event held Friday, March 16 at the Choteau Baptist Church. Seventeen presenters, ages 4 through 17, shared a variety of prepared speeches, illustrated talks, demonstrations and career communication portfolios to an audience of community members, judges and parents.

The evening began with a prepared speech by senior 4-H member, Caroline Roeder, about best use practices for Montana Public Lands. Changing the mood from serious to playful were presenters Claire Long, Natalie Hodgskiss and Addi Christensen who demonstrated three unique ways to make slime. The trio shared with the audience that they "love to make slime and share it with friends" and walked away with a grand prize in the pre-junior category. Grace Toeckes, pre-junior, demonstrated how to make her favorite peanut butter and jelly sandwich and was followed by pre-junior Ayden DeBruycker's demonstration for jarred brownie mix perfect for gift giving. Waverly Konen, also pre-junior, had us travel to France, making an ethnic Yogurt Cake and counting her steps in French. Her efforts earned her a grand prize for her age division.

Kyle Haas, pre-junior, demonstrated how differential axles work using a replica made from tinker toys and scrap wood. we now better understand how rotation speed helps us with winter driving! Brothers Isaac and Jackson Toeckes, both Cloverbuds, then shared illustrated talks on big equipment and big cats, respectively. Enthusiasm drove both of their speeches as they eagerly answered audience and judge questions.

During the Irish-themed dinner break, Daniel Asselstine, a senior 4-H member, went through a job interview with the judges and presented his application, resume and cover letter. The career communications category is a wonderful way for older members to prepare for upcoming college, scholarship and job interviews. Daniel won a grand prize in the senior category.

After dinner, 'lover of old movies,' Maggie Toeckes, junior, shared slides and her illustrated talk on the plot themes of Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers' movies. Both actors overcame obstacles to make it to the big screen and Maggie taught us how plots in movies from the '30s were ties together. Her sister, Mikayla, also in the junior age group, followed with an Illustrated talk on how to take better photographs. She used her siblings as models to demonstrate how using perspective, contrast and lighting enhanced the final photo.

Matthew Haas, junior, gave a prepared speech about the proposed new continent of Zealandia. After sharing the scientific data behind continental identification, Matthew voiced his main objections to the new continent. The evening finished with two food related topics: Madeline Konen, junior, demonstrated the art of making homemade pretzels and shared that, "homemade pretzels cost about 12 cents each to make which represents a huge savings over the commercially prepared snacks." Her demonstration earned her a grand prize. Brother Nicholas, senior, demonstrated how to make venison jerky using his favorite marinade recipe. Taylor Asselstine was the emcee for the evening sharing St. Patrick's Day facts and leading a few games. The Communication Day Committee would like to thank judges Shane Etzwiler, Carli Neal and Mary Tonkovich for their time and attentiveness toward our youth.

IRISH SODA BREAD

This bread was prepared for Communication Day by Kelly and Ayden DeBruycker. They had many requests for the recipe so here it is!

Ingredients:

4 C all-purpose flour, plus extra for currants

4 T sugar

1 t baking soda

1 1/2 t kosher salt

4 T (1/2 stick) cold unsalted butter, cut into ½-inch dice

1 ¾ C cold buttermilk, shaken

1 extra large egg, slightly beaten

1 t grated orange zest

1 c dried currants

Directions

Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees. Line a sheet pan with parchment paper.

Combine flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with paddle attachment. Add the butter and mix on low speed until butter is mixed into the flour.

With a fork, lightly beat the buttermilk, egg and orange zest together in a measuring cup. With the mixer on low speed, slowly add the buttermilk mixture to the flour mixture. Combine the currants with 1 T flour and mix into the dough. It will be very wet. Dump the dough onto a well-floured board and kneed it a few times into a round loaf. Place the loaf on the prepared sheet pan and lightly cut an X into the top of the bread with a serrated knife. Bake for 45 to 55 minutes or until a cake tester comes out clean. When you tap the loaf, it will have a hollow sound. Cool on a baking rack. Serve warm or at room temperature.

TRIBUTE TO VOLUNTEER EXCELLENCE AWARDS




